
SOCIETY SET UP DISPLAYS IN COUNTRY FAIR CONDUCTED SEPTEMBER 30 2017

Two members of the War of 1812 Society in the Commonwealth of Virginia, Charles Belfield, Color Guard Chairman and Mike Lyman, Past President, set up War of 1812 displays in Richmond County's "Farnham Country Fair" from 10 am to 3pm on September 30, 2017. The location was at the Commonwealth Senior Living at Farnham facility. Large crowds throughout the day attended and many visitors came to see our displays. Our War of 1812 displays included mockups of James Monroe's birthplace house being built, a display of the battle of North Farnham Church and of the Battle of the White House that took place at now Fort Belvoir on the Potomac River. Also displayed were War of 1812 artifacts of cannon balls, and other items retrieved from the grounds around Farnham Church, War of 1812 muskets and swords and many books, research aids and manuscripts about the War. Several visitors showed an interest in joining our society. Also in our display area, Revolutionary War items were displayed including a makeshift tent and a copy of the Leedstown Resolutions document.
