On November 11th 2019, at 2:00 PM, the Society of the War of 1812 in the Commonwealth of Virginia unveiled grave markers for four War of 1812 veterans. It was conducted in the cemetery of the St Marys White Chapel Episcopal Church located in the town of Lively, Lancaster County on the Northern Neck of Virginia. On November 11th 2019 at 2:00 PM, the War of 1812 Society in Virginia will conduct a ceremony unveiling War of 1812 grave markers at the gravesites of four War of 1812 veterans located in the cemetery of St Marys White Chapel Church. The veterans to be honored are:

<u>James Kendall Ball</u>, was born 27 Oct 1790 and died 28 Nov 1836 at "Edgewood," in Lancaster County. He served as a surgeon in the 92nd Virginia Militia Regiment. He was married in Fauquier County on 27 Feb 1817 to Anna Eliza Blackwell, (24 Nov 1801- 27 Jul 1847), daughter of Gen. John Blackwell and Judith Lee Pierce of Fauquier County. He was the son of James Ball (1755-1825) and Frances Downman (1758-1821). After the war he was a doctor and he Inherited "Edgewood"

<u>Joseph Addison Carter</u>, was born in 1795 and died 26 Jan 1838. He served as a private in Captan Thomas Alexander's Company of Stafford County's 45th VA Militia Regiment. He was married in Lancaster County

on 28 Oct 1817 to Elizabeth Chinn Nutt, who died in 1844, in Lancaster County. She was the daughter of William O Nutt and Elizabeth Chinn. He was the son of Joseph Carter & Sarah Chilton.

<u>James S Ewell</u>, was born 17 Sep 1789 and died 15 Apr 1878. He served as a private in Captain Hugh Brent's Company in Lancaster County's, 92nd Virginia Militia Regiment. Upon Captain Brent's death on May 14 1814, he served in Captain Williamson P Jones's company. He was married to Ann Chowning, daughter of John Chowning and Catherine (___). He was the son of James Ewell and Ann Lee.

<u>William Downman McCarty,</u> was born on 3 Oct 1791 and died 3 Sep 1848. He served as a Sergeant in Capt Robert W Carter's, Troop of Cavalry in Richmond County's 41st Virginia Militia Regiment. He married Mary B (___). He was the son of Dennis & Feliz McCarty.

Directions: In the town of Lively on Route 3, Lancaster County turn southwest on White Chapel Road and continue to the intersection with Route 354. The church cemetery is on the right at 5940 White Chapel Road. The parking area is on the right just past the church. The public is invited to attend. Direct descendants from any of the names mentioned above are encouraged to attend and will be recognized.

The War of 1812 Society in Virginia is a lineage organization of male members that have direct ancestors to veterans of the war during the period from May 1812 to February 1815 from any state not just Virginia. Assistance will be given to any man that feels that he descends from one of the veterans of the war so that he may join the society. One of the main purposes of the society is to identify burial places of these veterans and to place War of 1812 markers on their gravesites. They have been pretty much forgotten from a forgotten war for our country's independence. During the ceremonies we conduct throughout Virginia the veteran's service to our country is recognized and recorded.

He married first, Mary B (__), second, Frances Ravenscroft Carter Ball (1794-5 Apr 1859). He was the son of Dennis & Elizabeth McCarty.

During the War of 1812 the American flag of our country was called the Star Spangled Banner Flag consisting of fifteen stars and fifteen stripes. A rendition of this flag will be carried in the Color Guard at this ceremony.





War of 1812 Society conducts grave marking on Veterans Day

LANCASTER—On a day when the nation stops to remember the service of its soldiers, the War of 1812 Society in Virginia continued working to preserve the memory of veterans in an often forgotten war.

The society on Veterans Day, Monday, November 11, held a ceremony at St. Mary's Whitechapel cemetery in Lancaster to mark the graves of four area veterans—James Kendall Ball, Joseph Addison Carter, James S. Ewell and William Dowman McCarty—who served in what is sometimes referred to as the nation's second battle for independence.

Welcoming those gathered, which included members of the society, the U.S. Daughters of 1812 and descendants of the veterans, Rev. Charles Sydnor, past president of the Northern Neck Historical Society said, "How we remember our past dictates our future."

"What is kept in memory is never forgotten," said society graves chairman Mike Lyman before the unveiling of the four grave markers. Society registrar Hugh Markham offered prayers during the reading.

To remember the past, colors were flown, biographies were read, and markers were unveiled. Those gathered were reminded of a war which doesn't garner much attention, but without which there would be no "Star Spangled Banner."

The ceremony was one of several observances in Lancaster and Northumberland counties to recognize the military service of community members past and present.

Above a reporter from the Rappahannock Record, Kilmarnock, VA took photos at the ceremony. She prepared and issued the above summary of the event and on November 14th placed the below two photos in the newspaper,



A three-volley musket salute was performed at the closing by society members Charles Belfield and Hugh Markham. The practice originated on the battlefield when a cease-fire had been called by warring parties to care for their fallen. The three volleys would signal that the dead had been properly attended and the sides were ready to resume battle.
