Society Conducts Joint Marker Unveiling Ceremony with SAR on Veterans Day

On November 11th at 10:00 AM the War of 1812 Society in the Commonwealth of Virginia jointly with the Richard Henry Lee Chapter, Virginia Society SAR (Sons of the American Revolution) unveiled a War of 1812 and an SAR grave marker. It was conducted in the cemetery of the "Northumberland House" on Clarke Lane in Northumberland County on the Northern Neck of Virginia. Honored with the new grave markers by their gravestones were Lt Colonel James Moore of the Revolutionary War and Paymaster, Thomas Towles of the War of 1812.

MOORE, James was born in 1756 or 1757 in Chester Co, PA and died 20 May 1813 in Virginia. He served as a Lieutenant Colonel in PA Line. He achieved the rank of major on 2 Sept 1778. He was in battles at Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth, Charleston, Savannah, and Yorktown. He married on March 18 Oct 1787, Sarah Delaney (c1767-1 Dec 1814, probably PA), daughter of Sharp & (__) Delaney of Philadelphia. He was the son of James & Elizabeth (Whitehall) Moore. After the war he was a wine and liquor merchant. His daughter Margaret Delaney Moore, was born 20 Jan 1789 and married in Philadelphia, on 1 Oct 1807, Thomas Towles (born 5 Nov 1784, at Towles Point, VA and died 5 Apr1822)

<u>TOWLES</u>, Thomas was born in 1783 and died in 1822. He served as the paymaster for Northumberland County's 37th Militia Regiment during the War of 1812. He was married in Northumberland County, 1 October 1807 to Margaret Moore. Margaret was the daughter of Lieutenant Colonel James and Sarah Moore. In 1815, Towles purchased 200 acres of land, a portion of which lay in the heart of Heathsville, adjoining Hughlett's Tavern. This was the land on which Oakley stands today near the courthouse. His youngest daughter, Sally, subject to her mother's life interest, received this house. They had two sons, James Moore Towles and Thomas Towles, and another daughter, named for her mother.¹In 1838, young Margaret Delaney Towles married John D. McAdam.
