Three members of the Society of the War of 1812 in Virginia attended the Norfolk Chapter of the Virginia Sons of the American Revolution event in Virginia Beach on September 7, 2024. The event was the 243rd Anniversary of the Battle of the Capes which took place off the Virginia Capes on September 5, 1781. Although no Virginia troops or naval personnel participated in the battle, the French navy under the command of Admiral Compte de Grasse defeated the British navy and made possible the subsequent victory of the American and French forces at Yorktown on October 19, 1781. Among the Virginia Society's participants were President Stuart Butler, 1st Vice President Kenneth Hawkins, and Councillor Timothy Ahlgrim, all of whom are also members of the Sons of the American Revolution. Enclosed are pertinent pages from the official program describing the event and photos (taken by Tim Ahlgrim). There were over forty different organizations laying wreaths during the event.

The event took place in front of the statue of Compte de Grasse, a gift from France, near the Old Cape Henry Lighthouse in Virginia Beach·Although it was a rainy day, nearly 100 people gathered there to observe the festivities. It is a nationally recognized event·

The naval battle of September 5, 1781, that took place just a few miles east of where we are gathered, is one of the most critical naval battles in the history of the United States. The "Battle of the Virginia Capes" lasted only two-and-a-half hours, and did not involve any Americans, but was a decisive factor in America's quest for independence from Great Britain. Without the Battle of the Capes, or the Battle of the Chesapeake as the French call it, the Franco-American victory at Yorktown may not have taken place

On October 20th, 1781, General George Washington gratefully wrote Admiral Comte de Grasse to thank him "... in the Name of America, for the glorious event for which she is indebted to you..." The Admiral responded with a masterful understatement on November 3rd "I consider myself infinitely happy to have been of some service to the United States ..."

And on this day, from all Americans, "Admiral de Grasse, we will always be in your debt. We will never forget your
